TEACHING SUMMARY:

We all have difficult people in our lives. These difficult people reveal how much like Jesus we really are. God also uses difficult people to make us more like Jesus. Jesus said we are to love others—even difficult “others”—the way He has loved us. This means we have to forgive them.

One of the ways our adversary keeps us from becoming like Jesus is by making us believe it’s okay to withhold forgiveness.

We cannot follow Jesus, receive His forgiveness, and not forgive others. The Apostle Paul wrote to the church in Ephesus and said you are to forgive “each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.”

Forgiving others isn’t easy. It’s sacrificial and has to be walked out in the same way God has forgiven you.
