Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. ²⁷ But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. ²⁸ God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, ²⁹ so that no one may boast before him. ³⁰ It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption. ³¹ Therefore, as it is written: "Let the one who boasts boast in the Lord." ^{2:1} And so it was with me, brothers and sisters. When I came to you, I did not come with eloquence or human wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God. ² For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. ³ I came to you in weakness with great fear and trembling. ⁴ My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, ⁵ so that your faith might not rest on human wisdom, but on God's power. 1 Corinthians 1:18, 25-2:5 (NIV)



⁷ Therefore, in order to keep me from becoming conceited, I was given a thorn in my flesh, a messenger of Satan, to torment me. ⁸ Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. ⁹ But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. ¹⁰ That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong. 2 Corinthians 12:7-10 (NIV)

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TEACHING SUMMARY:

Our culture teaches us to avoid failure and hide our weaknesses. This leads us to put on a façade of selfconfidence, which is a pseudo-assurance, because we don't want others to see us as weak and vulnerable.

Jesus reveals the opposite is true. His life displays how God's wisdom and power is displayed in humanity's weakness.

The apostles trusted in this counter-cultural reality and God used their weaknesses, their insecurities, their past, their faults, and their whole story for His glory.

When we trust God and lead from our limp, we will discover God's power at work in our weaknesses. This is how God redeems every part of our story for His glory.
